Since then, his dedication and love for photography have taken him around the globe, and recently into war.

Sergeant Lock's inspiring pursuit of excellence and breathtaking imagery were recognized by capturing the prestigious title of Military Photographer of the Year for 2002 and 2005. His work has appeared in numerous major publications including The New York Times and The LA Times. He recently worked in collaboration with 125 of the world's leading photojournalists on a book entitled A Day In The Life Of The United States Armed Forces.
